A great and moving day

The weekend of 18/19 November was historic in the story of Holy Orthodoxy in Colchester and North Essex.

We inaugurated the life and worship of the first Orthodox parish church in these parts for one thousand years - or thereabouts.

Until the time of the Great Schism between East and West (commonly dated to 1054, just before the Norman Conquest of England in 1066), Christendom was united in One Holy Faith, the Orthodox Faith. As Orthodox faithful we have to question the Orthodoxy of Britain and the rest of the West after that time, though even then western Christianity must not be dismissed as simply false: it's a much more complicated question.

In the 20th century the ground-breaking Holy Monastery at Tolleshunt Knights has been established by Father SOPHRONY, of blessed memory, and the Holy Liturgy has been served from time to time, by various Priests, in Colchester and Clacton, and no doubt elsewhere too. But there has been no parish church as such.

However on 12 November, after the Holy Liturgy at the Co-op Chapel, we prayed outside St Helen's, and then "marched" in, all bearing holy icons, singing the troparion to St Helen – and were glad to discover that the building has fine acoustics. It was tremendous. On the following days, just a tiny number prayed daily there, and then worked on preparations. By Saturday the iconostasis was up, in an incomplete form. On Saturday 18 November, we assembled at 4 pm, with great joy, and, aware of the historic significance, we served
