

His Beatitude IGNATIUS IV, has been Patriarch of Antioch and All the East since 1979. He was one of the instigators of the 1940s renewal in the Antiochian Church. With others he founded the worldwide Orthodox Youth Movement called Syndesmos, The Patriarch's seat has been in Damascus for many centuries - in 'the Street called Straight', the very street where St Paul lodged at the time he became a Christian, as you can read in Acts 9.11. He has some 750,000 people in Syria, Lebanon, and Iraq, and large groups in North and South America, and Australia, and some in western Europe. The Patriarch is a gracious and spiritual leader.

Our new Orthodox Parish Church?

St Martin's Church is just down West Stockwell Street, the little street tucked in beside Colchester's splendid Town Hall. The Town Hall tower of course is topped by the statue of our Patroness St Helen. In the midday sun the church lies literally in her shadow.

As announced in last month's Newsletter, St Martin's has provisionally been offered to us for our worship. Negotiations are now beginning on terms and costs. For the moment there is little to report: progress is slow. I hope to be able to announce a day when you can view it inside, as it is.

Then we shall be able to do some sums. We must work out what funds we shall need to use the church (a) in a minimal way, (b) in the fullest way, (c) a compromise way, somewhere between the other two.

(a) a minimal way would just be making it possible to worship there at all (there are absolutely no objects in the church at all) - we would need a Holy Table, a basic iconostasis, a prothesis etc, the basic things just to begin - but it would not be satisfactory for very long.

(b) the fullest way would include such things as dividing off sections for a hall, for an office, building lavatories, etc.

(c) a compromise way would include some of the extras we would like, but leaving others to be programmed in over the months or years.

Funds will have to be raised whichever line we follow. Prayer will have to be offered. Sacrifice will have to be made. We shall have to work hard for the good of the Parish and of the Holy Orthodox Faith in these parts.

ST SAVA, ARCHBISHOP OF SERBIA

St Sava (or Saba) is a saint of the whole Church. But he belongs especially to the Church of Serbia, as its founder and organiser. By doing that he also founded and organised the Serbian nation, whose life and culture has been profoundly Christian from its beginning. Many today do need to be led back into their full Christian heritage after the years under Communism and the present dictator, but they have indeed been ignorantly and shamefully maligned by Western leaders in these latter years.

Born in 1169, son of the national leader, St Sava became a monk on the Holy Mountain, but later first Archbishop. He secured independence for his Church from the Ecumenical Patriarchate, and for the state from the Roman Emperor. The saintly Bishop NIKOLAI writes, in The Prologue from Ochrid, "In creating the Serbian



Church, he created the Serbian state and Serbian culture along with it...He gave a Christian soul to the people of Serbia, which survived the fall of the Serbian state." Naturally, he holds an important place in the hearts of all Serbians. He died in 1236.

It has been a great pleasure to receive a gift for our church of a lovely icon of St Sava (illustrated here) from a Serb in our congregation, DUSAN GAVRILOVIC. which he brought back from a recent holiday at home. It will bring a blessing on our Parish, and I trust that not only our Serbian brothers and sisters will pray before him, but that all of us will pray there for the peoples of Serbia in their continuing troubles. Thank you to Dusan. "Many Years" to the people of Serbia!

The Saint must not be confused with his nephew of the same name, St Sava II, who also became Archbishop - nor with St Saba the Sanctified, who lived in the Holy Land many centuries before.

WORD FROM THE FATHERS

The Meeting of the Lord, 2 February

et us all run to meet him, we who honour and venerate the mystery of the Lord with pious devotion. Let us all go to meet him with eager minds. Let there be no one who does not share in this meeting, let no one refuse to carry a light.

We add to this the bright shining of candles. In this way we show forth the divine splendour of the coming of him who makes all things bright, in the abundance of whose eternal light all things are bathed in light when the evil shadows have been driven away. Indeed this is the mystery which we celebrate, that the light has come into the world and has given it light when it was shrouded in darkness, and that the day-spring has visited us from on high and given light to those who were sitting in darkness.

UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH YEAR

he Church Year, of course, rolls on just as ever, whether or not it is a new century or even a new millennium. Next month it will be the Great Fast - in England called Lent, meaning Spring. It is the Forty Days leading up to Holy Week and Easter.

But before that starts the Church has an introductory period, beginning on the Sunday of the Pharisee and the Publican. On this day the Church gets out the Triodion book, which covers the period until Great and Holy Saturday. As Easter begins, she puts away the Triodion, and gets out the Pentecostarion. It may help to get it clear if I set it out with this year's dates:

20 Feb Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee: Triodion begins

27 Feb Sunday of the Prodigal Son

Sunday of Meatfare, Sunday of the Last Judgement

Sunday of Cheesefare, Forgiveness Sunday 12 Mar

19 Mar 1st Sunday of Lent, Sunday of Orthodoxy

26 Mar 2nd Sunday of Lent, St Gregory Palamas


