

Theophany (6 January) is a feast of the Baptism of Christ, understood as a revelation of the Holy Trinity. It is one of the very greatest feasts of the Church. Come if you can on the day itself, and to the Great Blessing of the Waters on the Sunday.

Last year we celebrated Holy Theophany by going down to the River Colne to bless it.

This was our first celebration of a typical Orthodox practice. We asked God to bless the source both of our material life, and through Holy Baptism of our spiritual life.

When we were at Bourne Court we used to go out and bless the spring and pond and water there. At St Helen's we had not been outside. But in 2005 we did. It proved a happy experience.

So we are going to do it again this year - unless the weather is absolutely frightful.

We shall have the usual Great Blessing of Water after the Liturgy in church and then go down in informal procession. Last year the ceremony concluded at 12.30 pm. This we achieved by starting Liturgy on time!

This year it is on the Sunday, 8 January. Do come and support this, and make it a real event.

Most of our Orthodox students will be on Holiday: unfortunately that is usually true at Theophany. No doubt many attend at home. Any in Colchester are warmly invited to come.

By car. leave Middleborough Roundabout (between dual carriageways Westway and Balkerne Hill), to Northgate, go straight along St Peter Street to Castle Park, continue round, up into Maidenburgh Street. Car Park, out of office hours: Oyster Court, close by in St Helen's Lane.

Saturday: Great Vespers usually 4.30 pm (check before coming) Sunday: Mattins 9.45 am (or Hours 10.15 am), Divine Liturgy 10.30 am

Confessions: Saturday after Vespers, or by arrangement Holy Marriage, Baptism, Funerals, Memorials etc: by arrangement

St Fursey's Chapel, 111 Neville Rd, Sutton, near Stalham, Norfolk Divine Liturgy: usually first Saturday of month 9.30 am

At St James Anglican Church, Clacton-on-sea Divine Liturgy: usually third Saturday of month 10.00 am

At the Chaplaincy Centre, University of Essex Divine Liturgy: one Saturday per term 10.00 am



HEATING: Our thanks for the gift of two electric radiators for the church, to warm us in the cold months.

THE NUNS from St Elisabeth's Monastery in Minsk, Belorussia, came in December, and I bought the following items for the church - somebody might like to make a gift of one, perhaps in someone's memory:

 Holy Water Blessing Bowl: This is a decent receptacle for blessing it, with three candleholders and a lid. (You will be able to help yourself to Holy Water if you bring a bottle to church. It is a good and pious practice to keep Holy Water at home so you can sprinkle places and people, including yourself.) Cost: £140.

Portable Lectern for books or icons. Our existing ones were made by our members in our very early days, but are now a little 'wonky' and

need replacing. Cost £55.

 Cloth for table or icon stand. A rather nice pale blue cloth. Cost: £35.




NEWSLETTER: With a combination of the passing of my years and my busier schedule, you may have noticed that more often now this Newsletter is sent out by post. This means our postage bill is much higher. I am always grateful therefore for gifts towards postage by those who are not regular worshippers here and do not give regularly otherwise. It means I miss seeing some of you as often as I did. It does not mean that I do not think of you or pray for you, which I do.

DORSET: The work of the Antiochian Deanery expands in various places, and St Edward's Parish in Athelhampton now has a new Priest. Deacon DAVID HARRIS has been raised to the Priesthood, and has taken over the work there. This has freed Father CHRYSOSTOM MAC-DONNELL to take on a new work. The Anglican St Osmund's Church in Parkestone, between Bournemouth and Poole, well-sited on a main road, and a fine building - appropriately strongly Byzantine in feeling - has been bought by a wealthy American Antiochian layman, and Father Chrysostom has started the work there. He lives comparatively close, and this will be very convenient for him. That conurbation is large, and the hope is that this will become a strong parish. Pleaser remember both these Priests in their work. A small point of interest is that I nearly became Vicar of that church many years ago!

HOSPITAL: PAUL LANSLEY was, as an Anglican priest, an assistant chaplain at the Colchester Hospital. He has now been invited to be Orthodox lay assistant there, along with others of other denominations. He will be able to keep an eye out for any Orthodox patients, and I am grateful.

relics lie still in Péronne, in Picardy. Feast: 16 January


A Word from the Fathers: Holy Baptism

shall now explain our method of dedicating ourselves to God after we have been created anew through Christ...

All who accept and believe as true the things taught and said by us, and who undertake to have the power to live accordingly, are taught to pray and entreat God, fasting, for the forgiveness of their former sins, while we join in their prayer and fasting.

Then we bring them to a place where there is water, where they are regenerated in the same way as we were: for they then make their ablution in the water in the name of God the Father and Lord of all, and of our Saviour Jesus Christ and of Holy Spirit.
