Transfiguration:

Promise for you & for me

nto the Holy Mount - Tabor in the north of Palestine, west of the Sea of Galilee - Jesus took just three of his Disciples, Peter, James, and John, his 'inner circle'.

This was after he had spent some three ears teaching the Twelve and all the disciples, preaching to the people, and performing miracles.

Now, just before he turns towards Jerusalem for his Passion, Death and Resurrection, he displays himself to them in secret. His inner glory, the glory of God, shines out upon them and overwhelms them, as you see in the icon. He is transfigured before them, and his light shines on them also.

With him appear Moses on the right, and Elias (Elijah) on the left. They signify the

Law and the Prophets of the Old Testament or Covenant, which is now fulfilled in Christ who is himself the New Covenant.

This beautiful, wonderful, moving moment teaches much about the person of Christ and his relation with us, his creation. It shows the true nature of Christ (his Godhead): we never see it on this earth except by faith, but shall see it unclouded in heaven.


The Transfiguration also shows something about ourselves, about our human nature. The word is the Greek word metamorphosis - and St Paul tells us that we shall all be changed - the same word - when Christ comes again. We shall be changed from glory to glory.

What a wonderful, reassuring promise this is for the Christian! That I do not have to carry into heaven my so wearisome and sinful self - I am to be changed, metamorphosised: both my body and soul are to be transfigured as Christ was transfigured.

I shall lay down my body in the earth and it will be corrupted. But out of that same body - as out of a seed of wheat grows the corn - will grow a changed body and soul, the same but renewed.

That is the promise, the promise of salvation, of fulfilment in Christ. What glory on the Holy Mount! What glory for us, when Christ comes again to reclaim us as his own! Father Alexander

Orthodox Pilgrimage to Walsingham

Tuesday 29 July

Join us for a Pilgrimage to 'England's Nazareth', the Shrine in Norfolk to the Holy Mother of God. It goes back to a vision of her to the Lady Richeldis 1000 years ago.

After centuries of neglect, Anglicans and Catholics again honour her in that beautiful mediaeval village. In the past, Orthodox faithful often joined in with the Anglicans. Now they are beginning to make specifically Orthodox pilgrimages.

There are three Orthodox churches:

1 The Church of St Seraphim, in the old railway station;

2 The Chapel of the Mother of God of the Lifegiving Spring, in the Anglican Shrine;

3 The Church of the Holy Transfiguration in Gt Walsingham.

There is plenty to see as a tourist, but it is as a place of prayer and peace that it is famed. It is good that Orthodox people want to go there on pilgrimage, to honour the Mother of God, and to ask her prayers for their needs.



In the West, and sometimes in the East, the feast is known as the Assumption - when Mary was taken to heaven.

It is a glorious feast, celebrating the occasion, according to tradition, that the Apostles gathered for her funeral and buried her in the tomb in the Garden of Gethsemane. Next day they found her body gone, taken by Christ to heaven.
