## Seizing an opportunity!

OU may remember that during May I was asked to help at the Christian Resources Exhibition at Sandown Park race course in Surrey. As anticipated, there were no horses running to distract me, so I was able to give my full attention to the stall I was helping at – NICHOLAS CHAPMAN's Orthodox Christian Books Ltd, a firm which distributes Orthodox literature, based at the village of Audley (near Stoke-on-Trent) where there is an Antiochian parish.

We stayed the four nights with friends of Nicholas in Redhill, were made very welcome there, and fed alarmingly well. It was good to have such an interesting home and such enjoyable hospitality to return to each night.

Setting up on Monday, we spent each day, Tuesday to Friday, at the stall, with occasional individual forays to see other stalls. These were of every conceivable type, and it was a useful opportunity to see lots of firms and societies together in one place. For example, I picked up literature about heating and lighting which will prove useful in connection with St Martin's [if we get it – see right!], and made contact with a firm which can find me a computer version of the Septuagint, the Greek Old Testament.

We met a number of old friends – Anglicans, Roman Catholics, and Protestants - and that was a great joy. But it was also interesting that several Orthodox people came along, and that was really lovely and encouraging: Fr SAMIR, from our Cathedral in London, was one of them.

Both Nicholas and I were very impressed, however, by the great show of interest in Orthodoxy by many of the Christian public in general.

We had icons available (supplied by our own Reader STEPHEN), and books of interest to evangelical Protestants and to Anglicans and Catholics. To a greater or lesser degree all these items attracted individuals. We had innumerable conversations with those passing by, some of profound importance, many of course of only passing interest, but which may help people in the future. It was an enjoyable week, profitable in terms of Orthodox contact as much as, or more than, in sales of books etc. It was altogether encouraging.

Some people were very interested in the icons of course, which have proved opening into Holy Orthodoxy for many. Some enquired of the differences between Orthodox and Western teaching. Obviously many of the 10,000 who attended would just have passed us by, as was their right, but Nicholas calculated that we had at least 500 visitors to our stall.

People, consciously or unconsciously, are looking for the certainties and reality, the richness and the simplicity of the Orthodox Christian Faith. Every night I prayed for those I had met that day and for those I would meet the next. It was good to help some of them, as I hope and trust we did, on their path to Christ and the fullness of our Holy Faith. I was pleased that Nicholas had grasped this very real opportunity to spread the Faith.

In so many ways, it seems the right place for us to be, even if there are and will be problems. It was even suggested to us as our church by the then Anglican Archdeacon as long ago as 1994!

But I admit I am getting weary. Please pray that something positive may happen soon, that God will forgive us our sins and grant us a home.
