By car: leave Middleborough Roundabout (between dual carriageways Westway and Balkerne Hill), to Northgate; go straight along St Peter Street to Castle Park; continue round, up into Maidenburgh Street. Car Park, out of office hours: Oyster Court, close by in St Helen's Lane. Saturday: Great Vespers usually 4.30 pm (check before coming)

Sunday: Mattins 9.45 am (or Hours 10.15 am), Divine Liturgy 10.30 am Confessions: Saturday after Vespers, or by arrangement Holy Marriage, Baptism, Funerals, Memorials etc: by arrangement

At the Chaplaincy Centre, University of Essex Divine Liturgy: one Saturday per term 10.00 am





'It is clear the Greeks are by nature superior'

The Times recently reported that a Leeds University professor tells us that the Greek philosopher Aristotle was right to argue that the majority of human beings could and should be enslaved, because they are slaves by nature.

We are not sub-human, and may even be extremely creative and intelligent - but we do not understand the way to the good life. Western society wrongly values economic prosperity and seeks eternal youth. We ought rather to seek our intrinsic goodness or happiness.

Northern Europeans are natural slaves because our climate is too cold. Asiatics and Africans are natural slaves because the climate is too hot.

We would all be better off, the Professor appears to say, if we natural slaves put our lives under the control of the natural, rational slave masters - 'the Greeks of course.'

Certainly it puts the rest of us in our place: three cheers for the Greeks, natural 'Masters of the World'!

St John the Theologian...


...is a wonderful figure, one of the Twelve Apostles, the youngest - only a lad - the 'beloved disciple'. He was at the foot of the Cross comforting Mary Theotokos. As he died, Christ entrusted them to each other. Later he worked in Asia Minor, as Bishop of Ephesus. Alone of the Twelve, he escaped martyrdom, dying in peace at a great age.

According to tradition he wrote the fourth Gospel, the three New Testament Letters, and also the Book of the Apocalypse or Revelation, composed on Patmos.

One of his feasts falls on 8 May, another on 26 September.

A Word from the Fathers: St Constantine the Great

pre-eminent among the Roman emperors as a worshipper of God; alone as the bold proclaimer to all men of the doctrine of Christ; having alone rendered honour, as none before him had ever done, to his Church; having alone abolished utterly the error of polytheism, and discountenanced idolatry in every form:

so, alone among them both during life and after death, was he accounted worthy of such honours as none can say have been attained to by any other; so that no one, whether Greek or Barbarian, nay, of the ancient Romans themselves, has ever been presented to us as worthy of comparison with him.

CONTINUING ANGLICAN BISHOP ROBERT WAGGENER and his wife NANCY visited this Parish last October, meeting some of you over coffee. It is marvellous to hear that they have now begun the journey into Holy Orthodoxy in Lynchburg, Virginia. With some twenty of their people, and another priest, his wife and a dozen people, they are founding a new Orthodox Parish (Western Rite). We wish them well and pray that they may be much blessed as Orthodox. Robert will be the first known "continuing Anglican" Bishop to become Orthodox. A married_ man, he will now be a Priest, and is likely to be ordained in six to twelve months' time.

IN CHURCH: It was so good to see JOHN (JONATHAN) JONES in church on Good Friday. He has been quite ill, but is now back at work. We pray his health will continue to improve.

PHILIP SHERRARD was a highly respected English Orthodox theologian. He died a few years ago. A Symposium in his honour is to be held 3/4 June at Kings College London (where he taught), with a list of eminent speakers, including his friend BISHOP KALLISTOS. He was brother-in-law to RICHARD COBBOLD, and his wife DENISE was godmother to CHRISTODOULI. CONGRATULATIONS to MANYA PAGIAVLA, who has been awarded her PhD on El Greco, the great Greek painter. Manya has been at the University of Essex for some years, so we have got to know her well. She is as yet uncertain where she will now work, but we wish her well.
