But I could not but be a little sad that we had lost our Archbishop. He is a good, lovely man of prayer, and we have known him for over ten years, four and a half as Metropolitan.

We shall miss him then, but know that he still carries us in his heart. And our loss is the gain of the whole Church of Antioch.

Our Dean was there representing us in Beirut. While there he was also presenting to the new Patriarch and the Holy Synod a request from the clergy to have a Bishop actually living in Britain.

We even petitioned that Fr Philip Hall, Parish Priest in Lincoln, be consecrated to that office - under the new Metropolitan of Europe, whoever that might be.

With some trepidation we await hearing how this was received. But we do believe that is what is needed here.

Please pray that God's will be done.

We have been very busy and particularly blessed these past few weeks. Things are moving fast. All Saints is being transformed - through prayer and hard-work - from a cold, unloved, former-Anglican meeting-house, into a genuine Orthodox Temple, a transformation which will be completed and crowned with the blessing and the first Divine Liturgy served here on 2nd March.

The faithful have gathered (often in sub-zero temperatures) on several work-days. All Saints is being tidied and cleaned, cracks filled, churchyard tilled, protestant pews and choir-stalls have been removed. And, most dramatically, Vladut Maiaron has installed our Iconostasis. Our new Holy Table and its altar-cloth are being readied as I type.

Our new Priest, Fr. Alexander Tefft, has visited and is delighted with our new home.

By the Grace of God, our (financially poor) community has been enriched by substantial monetary gifts, from individuals, of £500 and £1250, plus £1000 from St Helen's. And the Lyon family continue to

act as our benefactors and patrons.

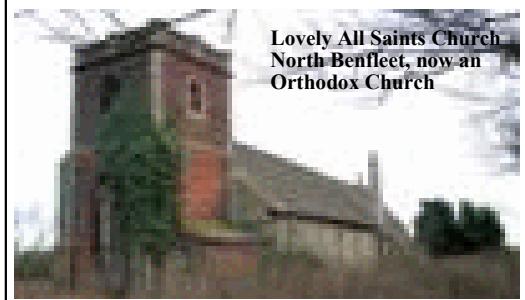

Thomas Aquinas: divider or unifier?

The modern Orthodox perception is that thirteenth-century Aquinas, greatly revered in the West, is un-Orthodox. Dr Marcus Plested of the Cambridge Orthodox Institute challenges this view. We have a great chance to hear him and his views here in St Helen's on **Tuesday 5 March** (7.30 pm), when he speaks to the local branch of the Fellowship of St Alban and St Sergius. *The meeting is open to all.*

The story of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15.11-32) is read three Sundays before the Great Fast begins (3 Mar). It teaches us to repent of our sins and return to God our Father, for we shall be forgiven. On Cheesefare Sunday (17 Mar), the day before the Fast, Forgiveness Vespers teaches us that if we want to be forgiven by God we must also forgive others their sins against us.

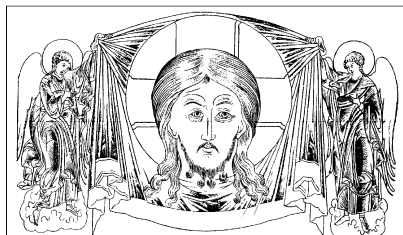

A Look at Lent

The Great Fast is often called Lent in English, meaning Spring. It starts on Monday 18 March - it's always a Monday.

On the previous day, Sunday after Liturgy, we have Forgiveness Vespers, where we ask each other's forgiveness for our sins against each other. This is so we are in right state before, in Lent, we ask God's forgiveness.

There are two distinctive services during the Fast:

- **The Liturgy of the Pre-sanctified.** It consists of Vespers and Communion from the Holy Gifts consecrated the previous Sunday. It is a very beautiful service, with a number of special features. This year we have it on **Wednesdays at 9.30 am.**
- The Akathist. This is a lovely hymn to the Mother of God in four parts, one each week, with the full hymn on the fifth Friday. It will be on **Fridays at 6.00 pm** (not 7.00).

Of course the main feature of Lent is fasting itself and stricter attendance at church. Do your best not to eat dairy products throughout, and no meat or fish (though we may have fish on Annunciation, 25 March).

A separate sheet to guide you on fasting will be available in church. If you have problems of one sort or another about fasting, you should ask your spiritual father for guidance.

Attend services more frequently if possible. Arrive on time.

Also available is the Prayer of St Ephraim, an excellent prayer for daily use at home and in church. It helps us in our search for humility before God and others.

It is also good, though no obligation, to do extra spiritual reading. There are numbers of suitable books in the Lending Library in church.
